"Jocko" Graves statues, insult or symbol of pride. Back in a time when the CB radio was the craze, several brothers and myself would get on the airwaves and do our thing. Often times other CB operators would engage us, frequently with insults because we were black. One phrase used by the insulting rednecks was "Porch Monkey". Well, I had no idea what a porch monkey was until one of the brothers broke it down to me. A porch monkey was the reference given to the little statues of a young black boy named Jocko Graves. Well after this revelation I wanted to go around to every yard I could find the statues in and "free" Jocko. It was not until my Aunt, the late Peggy Doleman, provided information about the historical account of how a twelve year old black slave recruited by General George Washington to help in the crossing of the Delaware river to surprise their enemy to help win the revolutionary war. After Washington had crossed they found the horses they needed fasten to what they thought was a tree stump, it was not. Jocko apparently froze to death holding the horse for the troops crossing the river. Washington had a statute of Jocko made and erected at Mount Vernon in tribute to the sacrifice of the young black Jocko Graves. So tell me are people putting the statues in their yards to honor Jocko or is it a symbol of racial insult to have a statue with black features stooped over holding a lantern like a porch monkey?

SPEAK UP

I was in a situation that had volatile potential. A fire occurred on North Prospect Street in the apartment of a young woman with a disabled child, her apartment was not damaged by the fire. However the lock to her apartment was broken by the fire department. The landlord was on site and I was asked to find I if he would repair the lock. With my hand extended, I introduced myself as a representative from Brothers United Who Dare to Care and explained the concern of his tenant. The person snapped at me angrily and began ranting. I made two calls: I alerted my response team and had my backup in place, I then called a member of the city council who intervened by phone when I handed the phone to the landlord. The door was repaired and the woman's family was properly assisted. I share this to send out this message. In my last editorial I expressed that "we can advocate without hostility and aggression". Please, so that there is no confusion about that message means know this: "Any act of aggression or hostility toward me or will be responded to deliberately and by any means available". In this case, that individual was almost tossed down a flight of stairs, but two phone calls put him in his place. So, don't mess with me. If you can't leave someone better than they were, LEAVE THEM ALONE!
